#### **AVID Students Participate in Mock Interviews**

n its 16th year of operation, the AHS AVID program is an elementary through postsecondary college readiness system that's designed to increase school-wide learning and performance.

Co-Coordinator of the program and Alumni Association member, Melanie Patterson, Class of 1993, explained that the "Advancement Via Individual Determination (AVID)" program was designed to prepare all students for college, particularly those who would be the first generation in their family to pursue further education.

In May, several Alumni volunteers, as well as Kiwanas volunteers, got a chance to be part of the AVID program by participating in mock interviews under Patterson's guidance. The volunteers pretended to interview the students for a job or a scholarship. The students were then critiqued on their appearance, professionalism, reasoning skills and communication, which Patterson said would be used as feedback for the students.

Alumni Board member **Kristina Randerson** also volunteered as did Kiwanis volunteers Diane and Kent Rasmussen, and Larry James.

Research-based methods of teaching are used in the accelerated learning program in which almost 300 students are involved.

He gets that opportunity in world history and as head coach of the girls' basketball team.

## Marching Band Takes Steps to Return to Pasadena with Hopes of Participating in Rose Bowl

The march to the Rose Bowl Parade is a long one. But the Arlington High marching band is taking the steps to get there.

AHS has been there before, in

1967. As it now takes almost two years to wrangle an invite, the band and supporters are working through the rigorous application now in hopes of coinciding with the 60th anniversary of that first visit with a Colt band marching the Pasadena, CA, streets again in 2027.

It is also bringing some of the Colts from the first historic event out to encourage and enthuse the current group of marchers.

Those students-now-alumni were asked to raise \$50 each for the trip. That would be about \$500 in today's dollars. Becky Graves Hughes says she got a job at the Dairy Queen in her quest. Brenda Sprayberry Barnes gave her spare time to one of the quintessential businesses in the city's history, Randol

any hijinks during the trip, Martin Meek laughed "none of your business!" It should be noted her father was long-time Arlington School District Superintendent James Martin. And she said she did beg the chaperones who had volunteered for the trip, that her mother not be assigned to the Martin Meek bus.

Don Inman says the band didn't just march and play in the parade, but anywhere they could find. He recalled tunes up and down the halls of UCLA dorms showing the Colt spirit.

Inman also said when the band visited Disneyland, they couldn't fathom how all the Six Flags Over Texas stickers wound up on the upper levels of Magic Mountain. But he suspected

band members.

Before the current band members can ponder any fun, there is a lot of work to be done. The process isn't an annual application, but any acceptance would only be for the 2027 parade. Applicants must submit an array of proof they belong on the route, including a video. With such a long timeline, it means some current band members will never get the opportunity as they will have graduated.

But junior drum majors Mark Bangs and Jamison Adams said it was a happy duty to prepare the band for admission.

"It would be super cool to say that is our legacy," Bangs said.

"We're just helping to build this band and make opportunities," Adams said.

It is an opportunity across the city now that AHS has opened its expansion that includes a fine arts magnet from the speciality program at Gunn Junior High. Students now at Gunn, and some of the freshman currently in the soon-to-be 220-person band, would be the performers.

"It's a lot of work, but I feel it's so worth it," said freshman oboe player Isabella Morales. Her cohort Aubrey Lilley said she expects to be engaged in a lot of fundraisers in the future.

The running joke among the marching band community is it had to take a 105-degree turn to make the Rose Bowl pitch. Standard marching band pivot is 90-degrees, but the route makes Rose Bowl Parade marchers prove they can execute a 105-degree turn. The current work to accomplish the turn and get it on submission video is complicated, since the end of the football season means the marching has been on hold.

Martin Meek warns of more challenges if the invite is issued. The parade route is five miles, but the twists and turns make it more like a 10-mile high step.

"It was like we were in the Army," she laughed.

brings him back around.

As telling is the clock in the classroom. It is standard issue of the class ticking by. But on the whiteboard all around it are affirmative statements, such as "Believe you can and you are halfway there." They aren't education major tricks. Floyd says former students wander by sometimes and put up the statements.


Students are just less social than they were even a few years ago. All the technology makes them less likely to communicate even with each other, much less adults. "It's too much," Floyd recognized. "It's a lot of making them talk." For the vocabulary exercise, they were teamed into groups of two, and Floyd says even that makes them uncomfortable. It has been exacerbated by the time they would have been interacting and learning social skills that was interrupted by Covid.

"It's coming back around," Floyd said.

This is the third consecutive year a teacher from the AHS Social Studies Department has won the district award. Floyd credits the department heads for creating an atmosphere that leads to such accolades.

The committee that chose Floyd for the honor noted his expression of his caring for students, innovation, inspiration to learn and communicating of materials well. Elevating him even more, in the committee's review, was that he considers teaching a calling instead of a mere job and understands the skills that make a good teacher, including setting clear goals for students and a personal plan for his own improvement.

#### **AHS FFA Teams Compete for State Honors**

ifty years ago, the Future Farmers of America organization at AHS was synonymous with Old MacDonald - with a moo-moo here, and a neigh-neigh there and a baa-baa everywhere. How those times have changed.

Tanner Smith, AHS Ag Science teacher and FFA Advisor,

leads today's FFA students in expanded programs which include Vet Science, Floricultural and Wildlife. Through the statewide Wildlife Alliance for Youth program, which helps to raise awareness of the increasing importance of wildlife to farmers and ranchers, FFA and 4-H students compete in regional contests with the top teams going to state. This spring, AHS students brought back both individual and team honors in their respective categories.

The Wildlife and Recreation Management Career Development Event (CDE) was started by the Wildlife Alliance for Youth almost 30 years ago in an effort to educate youth on wildlife careers and enterprises in Texas.

"Arlington High Ag Teacher Trey Polster (1985-2018) was one of the first to train a team and compete in the contest and helped to get it started," Smith said, explaining the history of the events. He added that since the start of the competition, a team fron AHS has advanced to the state contest every year, except for three.

The FFA Wildlife team competed at the Region 5 Wildlife contest in Eastland in April. Out of the 60 teams competing, they placed first in Area 5 and eighth in the Region, which secured them a spot to compete at the state level. Area Wildlife team members

include Zach Bastas, Spencer Doughty, Morgan Jones, and Catherine Knowles.


"To say I am proud is an understatement," Smith said. "This contest is one I hold dear to my heart competing while an AHS student and now training as an AHS teacher! These students are leaving a legacy for the future Wildlife teams!"

Earlier in the year, the FFA Wildlife team hosted its first local wildlife contest, partnering with River Legacy Nature Center, in which 12 teams from across the state were represented. The contest featured eight sections including plant identification, biological facts, habitat evaluation, fish and game laws, safety and techniques.

In the biological facts section, students took a multiplechoice test covering native Texas wildlife species, including white-tailed and mule deer, bobwhite and scaled quail, wild turkey, pronghorn antelope, fox and gray squirrel, mourning and white-winged doves and waterfowl. The fish and game laws portion required competitors to study the Texas Outdoor Annual and complete a multiple-choice test on the state's hunting and fishing regulations.

AHS students competed in the FFA state CDE contests this year and four teams advanced to the finals with Evan Strayhorn placing third in Individual Poultry Evaluation. Teams making it to the state competition and receiving recognition were: Poultry Evaluation, 5th place; Wildlife, 30th place; Floriculture, 54th place; and Vet Science, 72nd place. "This has been an amazing CDE season for Arlington FFA and we are so proud of all our teams that competed this year!"

For the Safety section, students demonstrated knowledge of hunter and boater education through a written test. The habitat evaluation portion required participants to analyze a scenario, study a map and physically assess a plot of land to determine if it provided the necessary food, water and shelter for wildlife. The techniques portion involved identifying 20 different objects related to wildlife management, such as skulls, traps, tracks, water samples, scat and GPS tracking devices.

In the plant identification section, students identified up to 15 flagged plants from a pool of 125 native Texas species and determined which wildlife consumed each plant.

"I am so proud of the turnout of the contest," Smith said. "My team was incredible. They were group leaders and helped set up every bit of the contest and take it all down to make sure River Legacy was left in the same shape as we got it."

He earned a football scholarship to the University of Texas, graduating in 1967. Afterwards, he received his Master of Business degree at NTSU and then graduated from SMU's Southwestern
