**JOHN WADE, SR.**, Class of 1977 and a third generation AHS alumni, excelled in athletics, named as Co-MVP for the 1976 Colts football team, before playing for TCU and UTA. A TCU scholarship recipient, he was named All American Freshman. At UTA, Wade received the Defense MVP award and took home the Bubba Garner (AHS '62) outstanding athlete award.

Wade remains very involved with the Arlington High School booster club and sponsors events for

the baseball and football teams. He has also coached Optimist football for 10 years for the Highlanders.

In 1982, he started his own roofing company, existing today as John Wade Roofing.

Wade, part of a pioneer Arlington family, married his high school sweetheart, Teresa, 48 years ago. They have three children and eight grandchildren – the oldest will be a freshman at Arlington High this fall.

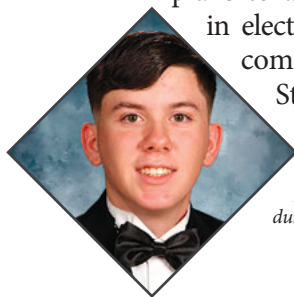

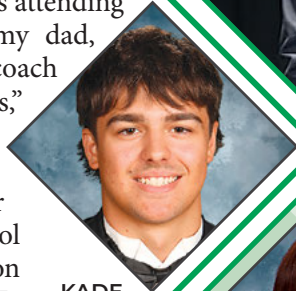


Many students describe their Arlington High School experience as a family affair. For **KADE STORY**, it is genetically true.

## “The Greatest Class Alive, the Senior Class of ’75” Celebrates 50 Year Reunion; Rekindles Friendships

**M**embers of the Arlington High School Class of 1975 gathered in June to celebrate the 50th anniversary of their graduation.

They joined in three events. The first was an informal event on a Friday evening at J. Gilligan’s Bar and Grill with an estimated 125 in attendance. The following Saturday 150 traveled to Esperanza’s in Fort Worth for a more formal dinner. A reported less than a dozen more who didn’t want to make the trip to Fort Worth stayed in Arlington that night at Candlelight Inn.

Several AHS graduates said they pondered long about attending the events with people they may not have seen in half a century. But they made the big step anyway.

“I tried to talk myself out of going, thinking I would be a wallflower,” said Glenda Bone. “But I did go and I am so glad. I got to hug people that I was afraid I may never see again.

“As we all squinted to read name tags, I was able to meet in person people that I

didn’t know while at AHS but got to know on (Facebook) over the years through the AHS page and friending them. We laughed, we took pictures, we shared a brief description of our last 50 years. I only wish I could have said goodnight to some that I couldn’t find before I left. My husband got to meet friends I talk about all the time. We are only here once. That night warms my heart. I think of it often now.”

“I was anxious, and not in a good way, about our upcoming 50th reunion,” said Vone Dempsey. “I’d been to all but one of the five and 10 year reunions, but this one would be different, the first without all three of my best high school guy buds who have passed on. It would be the first one where I feared looking my age.”

Dempsey said just before the reunion, she saw a post discussing being connected and in the moment.

“That was exactly what my heart wanted too, so I made the choice to do just that, anxious or not,” she said.

Dempsey said she brought along her ’75 Homecoming mum and other memorabilia to share.

“Being in the moment opened up the whole big celebration to me both Friday and Saturday night,” she said. “From my dearest high school friends, classmates I became friends with in recent years, to those I met for the first time, I genuinely enjoyed every conversation and hug.”

“I have a strong feeling of continuity in my life and solidarity with my classmates,” said Judy Plauche. “We’ve gone through so many rites of passage together. It only seems proper that we also celebrate 50 years since high school. For a class of people who celebrated doing their own thing, we sure managed to stick together.”

“I thoroughly enjoyed seeing everyone and I think the atmosphere both nights was electric,” said Debbie White Ellis.

She also shared an unidentified paragraph that she said sums up why people come to reunions.

“No one really warns you about this part of adulthood. The part where you start to feel homesick, not for a house, but for a moment in time. A version of life that doesn’t exist anymore. A place you can’t return to and a feeling you didn’t know you’d miss so much until it was gone.”
